LAUNCHING THE NAPIER AWARDS

After three years of preparation, the time has come for Pilgrim Place's launch of the Napier Awards for Creative Leadership.

On Wednesday, December 1, the five Claremont Colleges will submit application materials to us for the students they are nominating for the Awards. Each school can nominate up to three seniors who have demonstrated outstanding leadership promise in the fields of social justice, global peace, or care of the Earth.

Feedback from the colleges in recent weeks indicates a high degree of student interest in the Awards. The lead faculty contact person at one of the schools told me in early November that they have at least seven strong candidates for their three slots. "The Napier Awards," he said, "are clearly attracting some of our best students."

The two students selected by Pilgrim Place for the Awards will each receive a \$10,000 stipend to support a project they have proposed that will help them further develop their leadership skills. All nominees will be offered the opportunity of a one-year mentoring relationship with a Pilgrim Place resident having a significant vocational affinity with the students.

Over the last year two teams of Pilgrims have been working to put in place the processes and people needed to carry out our part of this innovative collaborative project with the Claremont Colleges.

One of the teams - consisting of Jane Douglass, Chris Hartmire, and Eleanor Scott Meyers - has developed the criteria according to which Napier Award winners will be selected. They have also enlisted an additional 12 Pilgrims to assist in the selection process. The other team - made up of Suzanne Brown, Ken Dale, and Steve Smith - has developed the process by which mentoring relationships will be nurtured with the students. They have also enlisted some 20 Pilgrims to participate in those relationships.

The whole Awards process comes to a head on Napier Awards Day - Saturday, February 12, 2011. Additional information about key parts of the Awards process will appear in the next issue of the NEWS.

FUTURE OF CALIFORNIA STATE PARKS


Ruth Coleman, Director of California State Parks since 2004, will be with us on Tuesday, December 14, 2010 from 9:30 to 11:00 a.m. in Decker Hall to discuss present realities of California State Parks and the future for our parks.

Before assuming the Directorship of the largest state park system in the nation, Ruth worked in several areas of state government such as the Air Resources Board in the electric vehicle program, and the Office of Legislative Analyst focusing on fiscal and policy issues in the natural resources area, particularly in the Department of Parks and Recreation and the Department of Fish and Game.

George Skelton, *Los Angeles Times* columnist, recently wrote in the *Times*, "Coleman is one parks director who actually camps regularly [sometimes with her family] and personally inspects the facilities and staffing."

Ruth also has ties with Pilgrim Place through her grandparents who were residents and through her friendship with Dean and Elsie Freudenberger. We are grateful that she has found time with a busy schedule to visit us from her office in Sacramento. We will have a special opportunity to learn how the state parks relate to our environmental concerns. Her visit is being sponsored by our Pilgrim Place Environmental Concerns Committee.

TOWN MEETING CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

-Proposed Amendments-

We last made changes to our constitution and by-laws in February 2009. One of the key changes that we made at that time was to reduce the size of Town Meeting Executive Committee (TMX) by eliminating from its membership the chairs of TMX committees. We anticipated that committee chairs might find reasons to interact with each other and with TMX. Therefore, we established a Town Meeting Council (TMC) and mandated that it meet three times a year.

In 2009 The Council was convened once. The other two times it had been scheduled, the meeting was canceled for lack of agenda. During this year, we have not scheduled meetings, as we have had extra Town Meetings and because committee chairs have brought issues of concern directly to TMX for discussion and, where appropriate, decision or action.

TMX believes that we should leave the Town Meeting Council structure in our governing documents for now but that we should remove the mandate that the Council meet on any particular schedule.

To that end, at its October meeting TMX approved the following recommended amendments to our constitution and by-laws. These will be on the agenda of the annual Town Meeting at 10:30 am on January 18, 2011. This article serves as official announcement of these proposed changes:

Pilgrim Place Constitution and By-Laws. Proposed Amendments

Amend sections as follows:

Constitution: Article 8, Section 2

“TMC may meet as needed. Meetings shall be called by the Moderator at the request of three or more TMX Committee chairs or upon decision by the Moderator or TMX.”

By-laws: Article 6, Section 2

“The Moderator may convene TMC as needed.”

"GO BAGS"

The Resident Security Council is dedicated to covering various contingencies that may be faced in a disaster. One such contingency has not been heretofore addressed on this campus. Imagine this. Fire is sweeping through the community after a major earthquake. The water lines are ruptured and there is no water pressure. An emergency evacuation is ordered. There is no time to think. At such a time, a "Go Bag" will be needed.

A "Go Bag" is a backpack filled with a three-day supply of food, water, change of underwear, prescription medicines, flashlight, emergency thermal blanket and possibly additional items. If an evacuation is ordered, you have what you need to survive for three days in one bag that can "go" with you on a moment's notice.

The Resident Security Council will have two short meetings, **Monday, December 6**, and **Tuesday, December 14** - both immediately after noon meal in Decker Hall from 1:30-1:45 p.m. At those meetings, "Go Bags" will be the sole agenda item. You will have the opportunity to order an empty Go Bag, food bars and water pouches with a five-year shelf life, thermal blankets, and a wind-up flashlight that requires no batteries. Water and food are the most essential contents. Both residents and staff are urged to attend. -*Ward McAfee*

RHSP COMMITTEE

Now that our Festival is over and it is time to count our financial blessings, our RHSP committee wants to thank you all for your great on-going effort. When our guests read the "thank you" card they often comment on how caring and supportive Pilgrims are of each other as well as the larger community.

As the new year approaches, all of us are looking at our finances. Some people are struggling to make ends meet because of pension cuts and lack of Social Security increases. Is it time for us to reflect on our goals of more simple living in retirement and make different choices in our daily living? We have so much comfort here in Pilgrim Place that maybe we can rely more on the resources of our own community and opportunities at the colleges.

We on the RHSP committee take seriously the responsibility of overseeing policy for RHSP funds. It is our charge to provide help to those needing assistance when they enter our community or when finances do not last as long as hoped. RHSP has ended the last several years without using all the Festival proceeds and without dipping into the endowment interest allocated; therefore the endowment has grown a little in spite of the recession. Everyone's efforts at the Festival assure us that RHSP monies will be available for those in need.

If you are experiencing need, please discuss your situation with our CEO Bill Cunitz, realizing that there are guidelines which he must follow regarding asset and income limits. Our committee has researched other retirement communities and denominational grants and find that RHSP limits are consistent with theirs.

Monday, January 31, RHSP will hold a forum to help us all address issues of asset and income limits which are influenced by our fragile economy.

Introducing John Najarian

John was born in Fresno, California, the oldest of four children to an Armenian immigrant father and New England Yankee mother. He lived at home through his college years at Fresno State College where

he went out for soccer and track while he also worked in his father's hardware store and was active in the First Armenian Presbyterian Church.

After graduation John married Daisy, a fellow church member and church organist. Together they attended San Francisco Theological Seminary from which he graduated in 1957. After briefly serving two rural Oregon congregations John moved on to pastor congregations in Salem, Oregon (1959-1969) and San Anselmo, California (1969-1981). At each position, he was active in community and civic groups, and in his San Anselmo years he served the larger Presbyterian church commu-

nity on the General Assembly Council, the Advisory Committee on Ecumenical Relations, the Board of Westminster/John Knox Press, and their liaison with the National Presbyterian Church of Mexico.

From 1981 to 1989 John left the parish to join K/P Graphics, a five-state, 12 division commercial printing firm based in Berkeley, CA. There he became president of the company in 1982 while he continued active as a layman in the church during these years. Then, a final move, he decided he wanted to retire as a pastor and in January, 1989, he accepted a call as pastor of Claremont Presbyterian Church from which he retired in 1998.

John's wife, Daisy, died of cancer in 2002. Their three children now live in Fresno, Sacramento and Colorado Springs and John boasts five grandchildren, grade 6 to college senior. Since retirement John has served as interim pastor in two churches and on the boards of two retirement communities. In his free time, you may find him at home at 699 Alden Road.

CHARITABLE GIFT ANNUITY

An option for Lifetime Income and More!

If you are concerned about lifetime income, you may want to explore the option of a charitable gift annuity (CGA); it may be a good solution for you.

The chart below provides simple calculations that are helpful. The annuity rate is determined by your age at the time the gift is made. It will not be affected by future rate change.

Single Life		Two Lives (Joint & Survivor)	
AGE	RATE	AGES	RATE
60	5.2%	60/65	5.0%
65	5.5%	65/70	5.2%
70	5.8%	70/75	5.5%

A portion of the annuity is a gift; you will receive an income tax deduction for that portion. In addition, a portion of the annual annuity *income* is exempt from Federal Taxes. Also, a two-life annuity will make payments to a couple without a reduction in payment upon the death of the first spouse.

Pilgrim Place will eventually be the beneficiary of the remainder in the CGA. The Endowment Committee encourages you to specify the remainder to the unrestricted endowment; an important fund that will provide resources for our future and for generations of Pilgrims yet to come.
