## WORK OF RESIDENT ACTIVITY CENTER TASK FORCE: A PUBLIC HEARING

A public hearing has been called for the purpose of reviewing the work and recommendations of the Resident Activity Center Task Force on Monday, January 17 at 3:00 p.m. in Decker Hall. All residents are encouraged to participate. On Tuesday morning, January 18, these recommendations will be presented to Town Meeting for further discussion and adoption.

In January 2010, TMX commissioned the Resident Activity Center Task Force (RACTF) to provide leadership in the construction of Pilgrim Place's new Resident Activity Center and to draft a plan for the use of its space. To accomplish this task, the RACTF gathered considerable data from residents, reflected upon its findings, and generated a set of recommendations.

As the Task Force engaged in its study, certain core principles emerged which guide the recommendations now offered for your consideration.

- The Resident Activity Center is a facility intended to serve the needs of all the Pilgrim Place community.
- Flexibility of use is foundational to our recommendations.
- Simplicity & clarity have guided our deliberations.


### Recommendations:

- The Resident Activity Center shall succeed Scrooby Lounge as the center for all major (non-Decker) resident activities. The Common Room will be designed to accommodate larger gatherings. Groups of lesser numbers shall be invited to select one of four smaller meeting rooms.
- All space in the Resident Activity Center is intended for multiple use with the exception of the Media Center whose use shall be restricted to this specific function.
- Archives Committee shall also be assigned specific space, but this room shall also be available for multiple use.
- Calendar Reservation System will be used to reserve space in Napier Center and all resident meeting rooms.
- It's anticipated that we may be able to move into the new Center by May 1<sup>st</sup>. It's also hoped that we can 'live into' our new Resident Activity Center through the remainder of 2011 before we begin to entertain notion of huge modifications in its use.

A new task force, a Rooms Management Task Force, will be appointed by TMX to serve until the January 2012 Town Meeting. The new task force will succeed the Resident Activity Center and Meeting Room Use Task Forces. These two task forces, appointed by TMX a year ago, have completed most of their assigned task. The new task force will seek to implement the recommendations of these two predecessor task forces.

Town Meeting Executive Committee (TMX) shall continue to be accountable for the governance of the new Resident Activity Center, as well as with all resident meeting facilities.

An Open House will be scheduled prior to the Center's formal opening, providing residents and groups the opportunity to determine what rooms and/or space they might prefer to utilize. *-John Rogers, RACTF Chair*

## MEETING NAPIER AWARDS NOMINEES

“These students give me hope for the future,” said one of the Pilgrims evaluating application materials submitted by the 12 students nominated by the Claremont Colleges for Pilgrim Place’s Napier Awards for Creative Leadership. Another evaluator noted “the students have an amazing grasp of world problems, and their well-designed projects respond by seeking constructive change with innovative and creative programs.”

The 12 students have proposed social justice, peace-making, and environmental projects among disadvantaged people in such places as South Korea, Chile, Ecuador, Thailand and East Africa, as well as the United States.

Jane Douglass, Chris Hartmire, and Eleanor Scott Meyers chair three teams of Pilgrim Place evaluators who have the tough task of selecting two winners for the Napier Awards. Recipients of the two \$10,000 Awards will be announced on Saturday, February 12, at the first annual Napier Awards banquet. Each Award is granted to fund the project proposed by the student. Additionally, all 12 nominees will be given the opportunity of a year-long mentoring relationship with a Pilgrim having a significant vocational affinity with the students.

The 12 students’ project proposals reflect remarkable vision and energy. One of them, for example, intends to help young people in Tanzanian and Rwandan schools develop their debating skills and thereby prepare themselves for productive citizenship. Another wants to record and share an oral history of leprosy patients in South Korea so as to help combat the ostracism and discrimination they typically suffer. A third student is proposing extension of gardening and other after-school programs serving at-risk teenagers in the Lower 9<sup>th</sup> Ward of New Orleans.

On the last two Sundays of January, the 12 Napier nominees will be at Pilgrim Place for lunch and afternoon workshops with the Pilgrims preparing for a mentoring relationship with the students. On February 12, Pitzer College will host morning and afternoon workshops for nominees and mentors. A late afternoon reception that day at the Petterson Museum of Intercultural Art will precede the gala Awards banquet at 6:00 p.m., which will be held in Abernethy. Paul Rice, founder of Fair Trade USA (and a protégé of the Napiers), will be the banquet speaker. All Pilgrims are invited to participate in the banquet.

The celebration of our Festival epitomized silliness, creativity, seriousness, challenge, and caring, especially for those who need support from RHSP. And I know I was not the only one so moved.

We also left a few things undone, most notably to me, the more efficient coordination of nominating processes for the many groups that function among us. Now we look to an exciting and challenging time of leadership transition.

#### **US CONGRESS HAS EXTENDED IRA LEGISLATION FOR 2010 AND 2011**

This tax bill extends the charitable IRA rollover for two more years. It allows individuals who are 70 ½ years or older, to make distributions of up to \$100,000 from Individual Retirement Accounts directly to qualified charities without having to pay income taxes on the money.

Also, the bill allows transfers made through **January 31, 2011** to qualify as 2010 transactions. Gifts may count toward a donor’s **required minimum distribution** for the tax year in which the gift is made.

## WOMAN'S PERSPECTIVE FORUM

On Wednesday, January 26, at 11:00 a.m. in Decker Hall, Susan Craig and Bear Ride will speak on "Pilgrims on Pilgrimage: Black Madonnas and Their Sisters." Since 1996 Bear and Susan have traveled to France, England, Scotland and Spain, exploring Celtic and early spiritualities; the lives of women mystics, saints and heretics; pilgrimage routes, stories and ritual; and especially the mystery and meaning of "Black Madonnas."

Statues of a dark-skinned Mary abound: from Isis and Kali to the Virgin of Guadalupe; from Sainte Sara of France's Roma to Mary Magdelene; and from Rocamadour to the Benedictine Abbey of Montserrat in Spain. In lieu of joining tour groups, Craig and Ride researched and planned their own pilgrimage routes, especially criss-crossing France where over 340 such figures are to be found. More than an academic study, they sought to learn about faithful women's attachment throughout time to woman/women "divinities." And they sought to learn and grow.

Craig and Ride will offer a presentation of different types of Black Madonnas, will bring resources, bibliographies and mementos, and will leave time for questions and discussion. All are invited.

## FESTIVAL EVALUATION

Special thanks to the many Pilgrims who completed Festival 2010 Evaluations. They were read thoroughly, taken seriously and compiled in a report for the Festival Committee's December meeting. It is the responsibility of the Festival Committee to review the evaluations and in the months ahead, to make decisions about which suggestions can be adopted. The comments from Pilgrims are summarized here.

What was especially good about Festival 2010? There was universal praise for the weather which was deemed perfect! The Thanksgiving Show was highlight for many people. Many folks commented on the extraordinarily hard working Buildings and Grounds staff, the positive attitude of B and G, and the good cooperation between Pilgrims, staff and community. Pilgrims mentioned their approval of the many food choices including the new Box Lunches. Other comments included happy children, new toilets and washstands, the decorative plaza, Vespers, excellent leadership and praise for the new route for the Massasoit Superchief and the Mayflower (though one bright three year old wondered how a boat and a train could be in the same place at the same time!).

What changes were suggested? The expressed needs for change will be considered by the Festival Committee as it moves toward 2011. Recommendations included: the experience of the PA system was either too loud or too soft in different areas of the campus; maps need to be in Pilgrim hands early and each booth should have a supply of maps so that we can be more helpful to our visitors; crowded conditions at the Boutique and in the Miscellaneous/Used Books areas were noted; all booths need to have the appropriate phone number to call in medical emergencies. There were questions about effort and expense in relation to income, a wish to insure that we work efficiently and have fun. We wondered whether our prices are too low. Pilgrims reminded us all to pace ourselves and take breaks. Others asked us to emphasize cooperation, rather than competition. There were some booth specific comments which are sent directly to Booth Chairs and some requests for change which are beyond our control.

Should we expand the time to 9 a.m to 5 p.m.? Votes on this proposal were two to one against it. Of primary concern were the issues of Pilgrim stamina and energy, early dusk, and the time needed to restock booths. A few suggested that we begin at 9:30 a.m. One Pilgrim summed up the majority opinion by saying that "God set Festival time at 10-4 and we should not interfere with God's plan."

Additional suggestions included considering an educational event in the Napier Center which would feature demonstrations of such activities as Tai Chi, yoga, flower arranging, and painting. A unique idea was to host a "Glue In Retrospective" and invite the community to bring Glue In creations dating from as far back as possible for a special showing (probably not during Festival itself); an idea which might also provide an opportunity for environmental recycling education.

George has considered it his lifelong personal mission to do what he could to honor the men who died in World War II.
